Haunted Noble County Book Talk

An Albion couple steps into the supernatural with their new book, Haunted Noble County, Indiana. They will be presenting at the Ligonier Public Library on October 17 at 5:00. No sign up required.


Released by The History Press line of Arcadia Publishing, the book is part of its Haunted America series. Mark R. Hunter and Emily Hunter spent over a year researching the book, and collected stories from many sources, including eyewitnesses.

"Every area has ghost stories," Mark explains. "We just put them together and added pictures."

Some of the stories are well known to locals, including the legend of Spook Hill, which inspired a famous poem by Indiana's former State Poet Laureate. Others stem from events in Noble County history, such as the hanging of a horse thief and accused murderer at the base of Diamond Hill, near Ligonier. Still others were told directly to the Hunters, including their favorite: "The Thing In the Basement".

They were also able to dispel some rumored hauntings, and in a few cases were disappointed to find no stories at all. "Look at the old Noble County Jail Museum," Mark says. "How could a place that atmospheric not be haunted? But we found no ghost stories there." Many of the stories they did find were from normal homes, but historical hauntings include places

such as the former Kneipp Springs Sanitarium in Rome City, The Strand Theater in Kendallville,



and more than one local library. It's not the Hunters' first foray into local history. Together they produced the books Smoky Days and Sleepless Nights: A Century or So with the Albion Fire Department; Images of America: Albion and Noble County; and Hoosier Hysterical: How the West Became the Midwest Without Moving at All.

The authors will have copies available for sale after the presentation.

Novel Points Book Of the Month: Home Before Dark

October's book is *Home Before* Dark by Riley Sager. Join us for discussion and dessert on October 27 at 5:00. Copies are available at the adult circulation desk. Twenty-five years ago, Maggie Holt and her parents moved into Baneberry Hall, a rambling Victorian estate in the Vermont woods. Three weeks later they fled in the dead of night, an ordeal her father recounted in a memoir called House of Horrors. His story of supernatural happenings and malevolent spirits became a worldwide phenomenon, rivaling The Amityville Horror in popularity - and skepticism.

Maggie was too young to remember any of the horrific events that supposedly took place, and as an

adult she doesn't believe a word of her father's

claims. Ghosts, after all, don't exist. When she inherits Baneberry Hall after his death and returns to renovate the place and sell it,

her homecoming is anything but warm. The locals aren't thrilled that their small town has been made infamous, and human characters with starring roles in House of Horrors are waiting in the shadows. Even more unnerving is Baneberry Hall itself - a place where unsettling whispers of the past lurk around every corner. And as Maggie starts

> to experience strange occurrences ripped from the pages of her father's book, the truth she uncovers about the house's dark history will challenge everything she believes.
